We all have people who are, or have been, especially important in our lives. On November 6, during our All Saints Sunday Communion service, we will be memorializing those who are no longer with us. For me, one of the special saints was my paternal grandmother, who was a source of unconditional love. Without her influence I would not be a pastor.

She came to live with us when she became a widow in 1950, until her death in 1955. As she became increasingly infirm, I had escalating responsibilities for her care after I got home from school when my parents were working, and when they had evening commitments. I would also make her morning tea (she had emigrated from Wales, and couldn't stand coffee). As she experienced a series of mini strokes, increasingly I helped her be mobile to wherever she needed to be in our home.

My other grandparents cared for me, of course. I do not intend to give them any slight.

My parents, naturally, were important. I especially credit my mother with my love of language and my father for his work ethic and commitment to doing what is right. We have saints of sacred memory here at Peoples Presbyterian. Like my parents and grandparents, they were not perfect, but were important, and we honor them, including those in our Columbarium.

The Ministry of deacon as set forth in Scripture is one of compassion, witness, and service, sharing in the redeeming love of Jesus Christ for the poor, the hungry, the sick, the lost, the friendless, the oppressed, those burdened by unjust policies or structures, or anyone in distress. Persons of spiritual character, honest repute, exemplary lives, brotherly and sisterly love, sincere compassion, and sound judgment should be chosen for this ministry. Deacons are the "servants" or "caregivers," the hands and heart of the Church in our ministry of caring. People have all kinds of needs. They may be recovering from surgery, grieving, lonely, ill, or in a time where they welcome the ministry of care from our congregation. Deacons assist the Pastor. At Peoples we also help serve Communion. We try to administer to the flock with birthday and Christmas cards as well as get well, congratulations, and other appropriate sentiments. We make visits to homes, hospitals, and nursing homes. Sometimes the visit can be a breakfast, or lunch out. We try to have a listening ear.

Zilkes were asked to sell us some pumpkins. They did so, but offered us a lower price.

Many little pumpkins adorned the railing in the sanctuary on October 23. Everyone heard the story of "The Pumpkin Gospel" during the Children's Message. Then as the closing prayer, we had an "eyes open" action pumpkin prayer. As the prayer was spoken, different facial parts of the pumpkin were described and then were revealed. The top was taken off to "open our minds," goo was removed, symbolizing all the bad attitudes and wrong things we do. Then descriptions went on to his eyes, nose, mouth and ears. Finally, a candle was lit and put inside so others can see our light shining deep inside us through the things we do every day. After each child had the pleasure of carving their own pumpkin, a copy of the prayer was attached to the pumpkin's stem.

Session Highlights from October 19, 2016

<u>Building Our Walls</u> The conversion of the heating and cooling system for the main part of the church to conventional electronic controls has been completed. Total cost of the project was \$28,550. The controls have been programmed to operate automatically. This means they will either heat or cool to the desired temperature during specified times (obviously, Sunday mornings, and other times that we specify). It has been recommended that we stay with these initial set ups for approximately two weeks to see how things work. When we have our annual mandatory boiler inspection at the end of October, they will assess how the system is working for us, and will provide training on how to change/set programs. The controls are very easy to operate, but we will provide a quick "cheat sheet" and training.

<u>Pastor Nominating Committee</u> The PNC has met with the COM liaison. We are in process of writing PPC's Mission Information Form (formerly Church Information Form). When that is completed and approved by COM, the COM will begin to send applications from interested clergy.

<u>Halloween on the Corner</u> PPC will again serve hot cider, coffee, and cookies to trick-or-treaters on Halloween during Milan's trick-or-treat hours of 6 - 8 pm.

<u>Buildings and Grounds</u> Work on the Manse continues. Painting of the walls is almost done. Carpet has been installed. The kitchen floor tile and grouting are complete. New kitchen cabinets have been installed. Still need to trim out the woodwork in the kitchen and seal the tile floor, and redo the wood floors in the bedrooms. Work is progressing slowly, but it is progressing.

<u>Christian Education</u> On October 23, the Children's Message and CE class were a Pumpkin Prayer Project. How are YOU like a pumpkin??? On October 30, the kids are welcome to wear their non-scary costumes to church and enjoy a special Halloween project with Ellen Bell.

Bring in your pop tabs by Sunday, November 20, so they can be taken to the Ronald McDonald House to be added in the competition between Michigan and Ohio State. We are starting to plan our Annual Christmas Pageant which will be held on December 11.

<u>Fellowship</u> Fifteen people attended the Merry Makers Dinner at Red Lobster on October 8. The next Merry Makers outing is scheduled for January 21, 2017, at Metzger's on Zeeb Road. A church family Christmas Party and dinner/potluck are being planned for Saturday, December 10, 6:00 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall. This will be coordinated by the Fellowship and Membership Committees.


