TRANSITIONS

RULING ELDERS: THE MINISTRY OF DISCERNMENT AND GOVERNANCE

"As there were in Old Testament times elders for the government of the people, so the New Testament church provided persons with particular gifts to share in discernment of God's Spirit and governance of God's people. Accordingly, congregations should elect persons of wisdom and maturity of



faith, having demonstrated skills in leadership and being compassionate in spirit. Ruling elders are so named not because they 'lord it over' the congregation ... but because they are chosen ... to discern and measure its faith and life. Ruling elders ... exercise leadership, government, spiritual discernment and discipline, and have responsibilities for the life of a congregation as well as the whole church, including ecumenical relationships ... (and) serve faithfully as members of the session."

DEACONS: THE MINISTRY OF COMPASSION AND SERVICE

"The ministry of deacon as set forth in Scripture is one of compassion, witness, and service, sharing in the redeeming love of Christ for the poor, the hungry, the sick, the lost, the friendless, the oppressed, those burdened by unjust polities or structures, or anyone in distress. Persons of spiritual character, honest repute, exemplary lives, brotherly and sisterly love, sincere compassion, and sound judgement should be chosen for this ministry. "Deacons may also be given special assignments in the congregation ... including assisting with the Lord's Supper."


PASTOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE (PNC)

"When a congregation has a vacancy in a pastoral position ... the congregation shall, with the guidance and permission of the presbytery, proceed to fill the vacancy. "The committee's duty (according to the process of the presbytery) shall be to nominate a pastor for election by the congregation."

Plastic Cap and Lid Collection

As you know, the children are in the process of collecting 400 pounds of plastic caps and lids. When we have collected the 400 pounds, we will deliver them, along with \$225, to Green Tree Plastics Company in Evansville, Indiana. At that time we will trade them for a park bench made from recycled plastic lids. We currently have over 50 pounds, so we are on our way . . . with a lot more to collect. It is surprising how many of these caps and lids you can accumulate. Four hundred pounds of plastic caps and lids will fill ten 55 gallon. trash bags. For your information there is a list of acceptable caps and lids below, along with a list of unaccepted caps and lids. They can be put into the container on the table in the Narthex or in the CE Office. Happy collecting!


