## THEOLOGY AND FAITH

As we approach the ultimately important Easter celebration, I believe it is important to reflect on traditional explication and personal implication.



#### <sup>34</sup> And Jesus said, "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do." (Luke 23:34)

It is very clear that this saying of Jesus from the Cross is, in the midst of pain and agony, a petition for forgiveness. And, we are told, if Jesus can forgive those who have cruelly tortured him, we, also, can be forgiven of our sins, no matter how egregious.

I know of a woman, then a young mother, who came home after taking her only child for a ride in the baby carriage. When she came home, she found her husband shot to death. She still could smell the gunpowder. And just the night before they had discussed adding to their family. The perpetrator was caught and convicted, and is spending twenty years to life in prison. Now a grandmother, she told me she had forgiven the murderer, wanting to spend energy on his recuperation, and the family her husband never had the chance to see.

I believe God's forgiveness is <u>NOT</u> dependent on our ignorance. Jesus' petition was factual – they didn't know what they were doing, just as oftentimes we don't know. But sometimes we do, and God does not exclude us from Godly Mercy. (Also, an alternate scholarly translation excludes "for they know not what they do").

And he is the explation for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the sins of the whole world. (1 |ohn 2:2)

Those of us brought up on the King James Version of the Bible, remember this phrase in a different way: He is the <u>propitiation</u> (emphasis added) for our sins... Propitiation implies appeasement. This appeasement often is preached, (especially intensely in certain churches) as <u>everyone</u> is destined to Hell <u>unless</u> they accept Jesus Christ, who, on the Cross, paid the price of our sins to God, even, (some say), from the time we were born.

Expiation is different. Expiation means that in Christ, God has overcome the barrier between God and humankind – the barrier(s) that have been erected because of our ignorance, sinfulness, and egocentricity. We believe in a loving God, who has done all that could have been done for us to "get it."

For many years, I was part of the process that credentialed people for professional ordination in the United Methodist Church. And, as a member of the committee that read and evaluated their theological work, I saw all kinds of faithful articulation, most of which was within the span of traditional and/or acceptable Christian theology. But the most powerful and faithful Good Friday / Easter affirmation I ever came across was:

The meaning of the Cross is not "Be good so I can love you." It's "I love you. Try to be good."

At this sacred time, may we see God loving us, overcoming barriers, forgiving us, and leading us into the paths of righteousness, not only now, but forevermore.

Sh-h-h-h they are sleeping now, but will emerge on Easter Morning when we will see the beauty of the glorious Resurrection. Magic crosses are on the window of the office celebrating the anticipation of the arisen Lord . . . Hallelujah! Be ready for a warm, homemade "pretzel" this Sunday as a Lenten gift from the youth.

A big thank you to Joan Cullip, Carol Vollink and Georgia Anderson for spending some enjoyable time with the youth in class during Lent.

"Crafts, Clothing and Cash for Foster Children" is our Lenten mission project. We are teaming up with Fostering Futures - Where Children Grow in Ann Arbor, as we help restock their clothing closet. When a child is brought in, they are given a duffel bag with a stuffed toy, blanket, nightlight and personal items. They also like to include some clothing (pajamas, one outfit, socks and underwear) but are very low in these items.

On the window in the Narthex you will find lots of bright pink butterflies with **clothing** items written on them. Feel free to take some down, go shopping and bring the clothing in and put into the tub provided.

Also on the window are a bunch of purple caterpillars with **craft** items indicated on them. We are going to create a Craft Tool Kit for use at the Agency by any of the children while they are there. Bring in the craft items and place them into the "craft" tub.

The children of the congregation are going to put together little craft bags to be used by the children when they have parental visitations. This gives the child and their parent something fun to work on together. If you have any crafts that would be useful in this effort, please let us know.

**Cash** is also welcome, to be added to the Where Children Grow Fund. Money is often needed for unexpected expenses with the foster children - medical, optical, etc, and allowing them the opportunity to join the Scouts, band, dance or athletic teams. 
