THE RESURRECTION IS REAL

Reading the Gospel of John in a particular way, Jesus' followers thought they were victims of grave robbery – no Jesus in the Tomb.

And, as often we do, Peter (one who denied Him) and the "other disciple" acceded to "reality" and walked away. There is no record of their feelings. But Mary Magdalene (the one of unfortunate reputation) stayed, and was the first one to see Jesus' Resurrected Reality. In just a few verses of John we know the Resurrection is real, is given to imperfect people, it takes a while for people to realize it.

Is it real? Of course it is! Just read and <u>feel</u> Mary's grief, her willingness to take care of Jesus, regardless of where He was, even if it be His corpse, and take it, herself, to another place. Hear the love of Jesus, when he says simply (and I believe tenderly), "Mary!" Experience also her excitement when she runs to the disciples and exclaims, "I have seen the Lord!"

The Resurrection was made real not only to Jesus' imperfect contemporaries, but also to the imperfect throughout the centuries, a few of whom have been our spiritual ancestors. Luther obviously was a brilliant man, but also obviously given to emotional excesses. Wesley, my spiritual ancestor, was a control freak who entrapped himself in a destructive marriage. Calvin's followers (I know a little about John himself) did some truly diabolical things in Geneva, and other places where his followers ran the state as well as the church.

We, obviously are not diabolical, still remain imperfect, and sometimes are slow to realize the power of the Resurrection we already have experienced in our lives. The Resurrection is Real when we surround a grieving family with love and support; The Resurrection is Real when a church I know supported a congregation with a mortgage that it would have been impossible for them to obtain in a more conventional way; The Resurrection is Real when we provide emergency assistance through Aid in Milan; The Resurrection is Real when people, without hesitation support an especially needy family in our midst; The Resurrection is Real when we knit head coverings for women in cancer treatment; The Resurrection is Real when we cooperate with other churches to provide food for the needy; The Resurrection is Real through the many ministries of our Deacons; The Resurrection is Real when we gather together to learn how to tell our stories of how God has been powerful in our lives.

The Resurrection is Real because we bask in the love of God revealed through Christ, and, by grace, increasingly love others as God already loves us all.

Promoting Earth Day by Taking our Planet Seriously!

It has been one year since we started our plastic caps and lids collection on Earth Day, 2016. We have really gained momentum in the past few months and it is very exciting! When we weighed the previous group of caps and lids, we had reached over 171 pounds. There are lots more to weigh. You will hear the latest weighing results on Sunday, and find out how close we are to our goal of 400 pounds.

The children will be presenting the Children's Message on Sunday, April 30, as they inform you about the background of the project through Green Tree Plastics Company, located in Evansville, Indiana. The kids are registered in the ABC Promise Partnership which stands for A Bench for Caps.

The project is very "kid driven" as a lesson in being a volunteer in the effort to preserve our earth and future state of the planet. Most importantly, it will save 400 pounds of plastic from being put into the landfills and waterways.


After collecting the necessary amount of plastic, the children will decide which style of a picnic bench to order, what color, and where the bench will be placed on the church property. The cost of the bench is \$225 plus \$50 if they want a special color (to buy the bench outright, it would cost \$375). The children will decide how they can raise the money to pay for the bench... stay tuned!

After worship on Sunday, April 30, the children will be asking the congregation to help them as they sort all of the caps and lids we have collected. All items that are not accepted need to be pulled out and only the accepted plastics will be poured into large trash bags to be ready for an official weighing. Tables will be set up and ready for the procedure. Come join us.

We graciously thank all of you (your friends, neighbors and families) for being so faithful in collecting all the needed caps and lids for this very worth-while project for the kids! Please continue collecting the caps until we reach our goal of 400 pounds.

FYI – In addition to prescription bottles and caps, over the counter medicine and vitamin bottles and caps are acceptable.

APRIL SESSION COMMITTEE HIGHLIGHTS

<u>Pastor Nominating Committee</u> The PNC members have now reviewed about 64 Personal Information Forms from clergy interested in our Called Pastor position, and are forming a list of possible candidates to interview.

Rev. Griffith's Contract Renewal Session approved a one-year updated Temporary Supply Pastor Contract for Rev. Griffith. The provisions of the May 16, 2016 Pastoral contract will continue, with the following changes: Vacation: 7 weeks including 7 Sundays (increase of one week in lieu of a cash salary increase); Study Leave: 4 weeks (includes 2 weeks rolled over from original contract)

<u>Buildings and Grounds</u> The sink faucet in the Fellowship Hall restroom has finally been repaired, and no longer drips. **Spring outside cleanup day is May 12 at 12:00 noon.**

Fellowship Easter Sunday breakfast was prepared by men of the church, and served 76 people. We started with 18 doz. eggs (donated by Zilke Farms), 255 sausages, two large platters of muffins and Danishes, and all that was left over were a few sausages and some mixed fruit. Thanks to all those who helped cook, serve, and clean up.

<u>Mission and Outreach</u> Although One Great Hour of Sharing is now officially completed, more fish banks and contributions will be received. The Pulled Pork Palm Sunday Luncheon was a success - \$320 (before expenses) was raised to pay for a fried chicken dinner for Mercy House this summer. PPC is scheduled to host the Mission Cluster meeting for area Presbyterian churches on April 26, at 7:00 p.m. Sue Barney and Chad Lawver will attend.

Worship and Music The Maundy Thursday Service took place on April 13, at 6:30 p.m. with communion, following a soup supper coordinated by the Deacons. At the end of the service, the Sanctuary was stripped of paraments, candles, and communion items, and a black shroud was draped around the cross. PPC hosted the Community Good Friday service on April 14 at 7:00 p.m. Four area churches/ministers participated. Easter flowers (38 plants) were delivered on Saturday morning, April 15, and were arranged by Worship & Music Committee members. The Rev. David Downton filled the pulpit on April 23, as Pastor Dick was on vacation.

May your troubles be less, may your blessings be more, and may nothing but happiness come through your door!





U is for the **Unity** of God's people.


V is for the Victory that will be ours.
